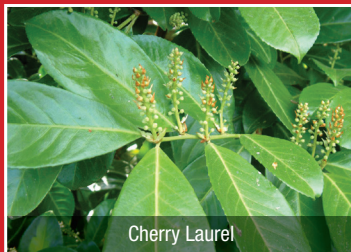


Dead Japanese Knotweed (Winter)

Other Invasive Alien Plant Species you may see along the river



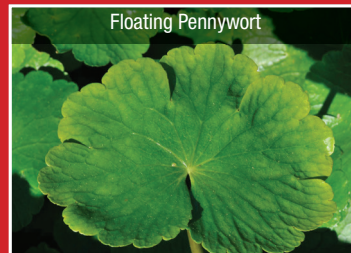

Giant Hogweed
(*Heracleum Mantegazzianum*)

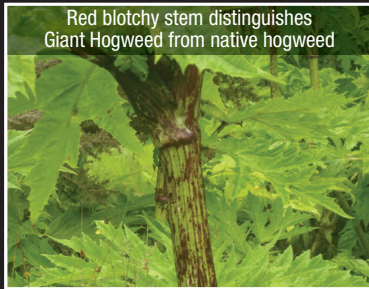


DO NOT TOUCH THIS PLANT

Flowering Plant (Summer)
Can grow up to 3m tall



Seed head of the Giant Hogweed (late summer).
In winter the tall woody stem will remain



Red blotchy stem distinguishes
Giant Hogweed from native hogweed



First germination
(normally one leaf per stem)



Rapid spring growth results in many jagged
edged leaves

Himalayan Balsam
(*Impatiens Glandulifera*)



Flowering Plant (Summer)

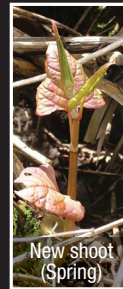


Young (spring) foliage before flowering,
Can grow up to 2-3m

Japanese Knotweed
(*Fallopia Japonica*)



In summer, tall bushes of heart shaped leaves



New shoot
(Spring)



Bamboo-like canes in dense
stands (Summer). Young (spring)
foliage before flowering. Can
grow up to 2-3m
